The Cllr Mollart opened the meeting and thanked everyone for attending. She informed the meeting that although Cllr Shevde was now Chairman of the Parish Council that she would be chairing this meeting and giving the Parish Councils report as outgoing Chairman.

**2) MINUTES OF THE LAST ANNUAL PARISH MEETING**

The Minutes of the last Annual meeting were available in the Annual Meeting report pack; copies were available for all present.

**3) MATTERS ARISING**

**Parking Restrictions**

The Parish Council had written to DDC asking that a review of all parking restrictions in the Parish be undertaken as part of the next district review. Additional off street parking was also requested.

**Extension of 30mph limit Heronden Road**

New signs have been installed and the limit extended has been extended to the entrance to Heronden Farm. Signs have also been erected on Thornton Lane.

There were some questions about traffic calming. A resident from Thornton Lane said the signs were to close to the end of the road and were already being hit by Lorries. The Clerk to inform the Highways department. **Action Sarah Wells**

**4) CHAIRMANS REPORT 2006**

**Cllr Mrs Iris Mollart Chairman Eastry Parish Council 2005**

I would like to welcome you all to the meeting. This meeting will close no later than 9.00pm so that you can enjoy a glass of wine and have time to talk informally to members of the Council and the other speakers. At our meeting on 8<sup>th</sup> May, Cllr Sam Shevde took over as Chairman of the Parish Council; I wish him well in this office and am sure he will get the same level of support from the Clerk and other members of the Council that I have enjoyed over the past 5 years. It was agreed that as outgoing Chairman it would fall to me to report on the activities of the Council during the past 12 months.

On your chair is a meeting pack that contains last years minutes, my report, the Councils Financial figures and copies of reports from other Village organisations. Please take this home and read it at your leisure. It will also be published on the Parish Council web-site.

I would like to take this opportunity to welcome Cllr Andrew Barwick to the Council, Cllr Barwick joined us in December and was appointed as one of the Parish Council's trustees for the Greville Homes Alms House Charity at our

meeting in May, Cllr Barwick will be taking the place of Mr Donald Eldridge who after many years of dedicated and tireless service has decided to step down.

The Parish Council would like to take this opportunity to thank Mr Eldridge for his service to the charity. Without his commitment the charity would not be in as strong a position as it is today. The many hours he has spent working behind the scenes has been much appreciated by his colleagues on the Charity, Parish Council and the residents of the Greville Homes.

The Parade project is progressing, ever so slowly but it is progressing. I'm pleased to announce that the legal work has finally been completed and the Parish Council now have leases on the area in front of the Bakers, Butchers and Chinese Takeaway. Our architect is in the process of getting tenders for the work to landscape this area as per the plans passed by DDC last year. The Council will then need to get funding for the project. Let's hope that now we are no longer at the mercy of solicitors that things will speed up on this project. It would be nice if it was completed during this Council's current term of office. As Parish Council elections are due in May 2007 that gives us 12 Months to get the work completed.

Did you all watch Time team in February. As you know the time team crew visited us in May last year and dug a number of holes in and around the village. It was interesting to see how what we saw at the digs became an hour long television program.

Unfortunately I still have nothing positive to report on the extension of the cemetery. The Council and the Rev Kent have written numerous letters about this matter but as yet no progress has been made.

Speeding Traffic continues to be high on the Parish Council's agenda, unfortunately as reported in the April addition of the Eastry Village News, following the site surveys undertaken by the Police the Council have decided not to proceed with the Speed Watch initiative, this is not all bad news, now we know that the roads with the worst problems in the village are not suitable for speed watch we can move forward and request help from the Police and Highways department. The gateway requested for Dover Road/Lower Street has been included in Kent Highways 5 year integrated transport package bid for funding, with a planned construction in 2007/08.

Eastry has been placed third on the list of local gateways needed. The final decision on budget allocation is made by the Dover Joint Transport Committee, the Parish Council will be lobbying on your behalf and I'm pleased to inform you that Cllr Sandra Hooper will be representing KAPC (Kent Association of Parish Councils) on this committee. However the more people that push for this gateway the better. The Parish Council have set aside £1750 in this year's budget to help fund traffic calming and hope to be able to increase this amount in 2007/08. It is hoped this will help to sway the committee members as it will make the project less expensive for them.

The Parish Council have also asked for traffic counts to be carried out in Felderland Lane, and for speed limit repeater signs throughout the village. The traffic counts are in hand however 30mph speed limit repeaters are not provided in areas with Street lighting. This is because the Highway Code states that:-

*"The 30 mph limit applies to all traffic on all roads in England and Wales (only Class C and unclassified roads in Scotland) with street lighting unless signs show otherwise"*

We will continue to push for help with speeding traffic, but can I point out that when speed traps are set up in rural parishes most of those found to be speeding are local residents. Please think about this and check you speed when driving around the Village.

The Parish Council Web-site is continuing to evolve, agenda's for meetings of the Parish Council and its committees are now available on line. Please take the time to look at the information on the Web-site it is one of the ways the Parish Council used to get information to its parishioners. I would like to thank Cllr David Carr for all the work he puts in building and maintaining the Web-Site.

In addition to the web-site it is now our practise to put a report in every addition of the Village News letter. This publication has gone from strength to strength and I would like to thank our partners in this venture, the PCC for there continuing support. I would also like to thank all those that give there time delivering the magazines to ever household in the Parish.

Coffee Break is still going strong and is being used as a base for other activities, the mobile Police Station visits every 6 weeks or so on Coffee Break mornings and HI- Kent hearing aid re-tubing clinic takes place on the 2<sup>nd</sup> Friday of the Month. It is also possible to borrow jigsaw puzzles on the 2<sup>nd</sup> Friday. Can I thank all of you that have donated puzzles to our collection. For our younger parishioners we held a football card swap during the Eastry School holidays and will be running another one during half term.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank Bob Priestley, our Community Warden for his work in the Parish over the past year. In addition to his normal duties Bob was also Chairman of the Village of the Year Committee. I would like to thank Bob and his committee for all the work that was involved in entering the Village in this Competition. I'm sure that without their dedication Eastry would not have been named Kent Village of the Year, or Southern England Winner in the Building Community Life Category. However without all of you that work tirelessly for your own organisations we would not have a Community that is worthy of such a title, so to all the organisations, businesses and individuals that make Eastry the place it is I would like to offer a big well done, I think you all deserve to be proud of yourselves.

I would also like to congratulate Mr Tim Halling and the staff and pupils of Eastry School for their outstanding results last year. Its nice to know that our children are receiving a first rate education and I'm sure this is down to the hard work of Mr Halling and his staff, well done.

Other people that deserve special thanks are Richard Swain for his continuing efforts in keeping the toilets clean and tidy. Mr John Kemp for always being available to do the odd jobs that come up with little or no notice, this is an invaluable asset to the Parish Council. Also thanks to the volunteers that open and close the picnic site, Richard Swain and Trevor Burton for their work at the pond.

And last but by no means least I would like to thank Mrs Shelia Broster, ably assisted by Malcolm for keeping the Village Tidy, not an easy task as we have a few members of the community that seem to make it there task in life to either make a mess or vandalise out facilities.

I said that my report would be about the activities of the Council over the past 12 months, but in finishing I would like to inform you of one major event during the next few months, The Lord Lieutenant of Kent, Allan Willett CMG, will be visiting Eastry on Tuesday 25<sup>th</sup> July 2006 to meet representatives of local organisations and thank volunteers for the dedicated work they do for the community. The Lord Lieutenant, who is the Queen's representative in Kent, will spend the afternoon visiting the School, Church, Alms Houses, Nursery, Youth Club, Shops and Businesses. He will then host an early evening reception at the Village Hall.

The Chairman thanked the Clerk for her work over the past year. She then opened the meeting for questions. There were no questions from the floor.

**6). ALLOTMENTS AND LEISURE FIELDS REPORT - Cllr Sandra Hooper**

**Allotments.**

There has been good and bad news regarding the Allotments this year.

The good news is that for the first time for several years we now have people asking for Allotments.

Several new Allotment holders are now hard at work planting and sowing. Before we can allocate any more Allotments it was felt that a programmed of weed control should take place, as some Allotments which have been unattended for sometime are very overgrown, and to show these to prospective new tenants would be enough to put them off gardening for life.

The bad news was that one dark and stormy night; a section of fencing was removed near Centenary Gardens. Not a small section, but 79m. This was quickly replaced, but at a cost of £745.

**Gun Park.**

Again this area seems to be a subject of vandalism at times. After a safety inspection two benches had to be removed as they were badly damaged. A replacement bench was installed however we are aware that over the past few years' benches have had to be removed due to damage. We are however hoping to provide 4 new benches, as we have now found an almost indestructible version. 3 of these will be in Gun Park and 1 will be near the path to Centenary Gardens.

These will be the same material as the picnic table in the play area near Centenary Gardens.

**Pavilion.**

During the year several meetings have been held between The Football Club and the Parish Council with a view to giving the Football Club a 20 year lease on the Pavilion. This will give the Football Club a permanent home, and hopefully they will be able to obtain grants to finance their plans for the future. The lease is now being prepared by the Solicitors.

**Skate Board Area.**

Several months ago we received a request from a youngster in the village asking for extra elements of skate equipment. Tracy Mapp, from D.D.C, asked if we would meet him to discuss his ideas. A meeting was arranged but unfortunately the young

lad did not attend and we were unable to contact him. We have not heard from him since.

It is often said that we do not listen to what the young people want in the village, but we did try on this occasion.

#### **Pond.**

Some work has been carried out on the trees by the Pond on the advice of the Tree Warden. Hopefully, in the Autumn Paul Hadaway with his team of volunteers will be able to undertake some more work that will encourage more wildlife and improve this village amenity.

#### **Church Report - Rev Frank Kent**

Once again, we have had a busy year at St. Mary's, with many different events and continuing connections with the village community.

We have had various social events, encouraging both congregation and the wider community to join for fun and fellowship, among these has been a Fun Quiz, Barn Dance in the Village Hall, our annual Church Fete, a Picnic in the grounds of Mr. Jack Bones' farm and an Art & Craft Festival which took place in the church over two days and which attracted folk from far and wide.

Our monthly Friday Fellowship Lunch continues to be extremely popular, particularly with the elderly of the village, who value the chance to get together, especially as transport is provided for them and they are provided with a very modestly priced lunch, freshly cooked in our newly refurbished church hall kitchen.

Various groups from the Village have come to the church during the year, including Bubbles Nursery and the uniformed organisations. The Primary School regularly hold services in the church and a new initiative has been started at the school each Wednesday lunchtime. This is a chance for teachers, support staff and parents to come together just for a short time, for reflection and prayer during the press of a busy day.

The church has started up a monthly informal service at the Day Centre of Eastry House, to which all are welcome and myself and Revd. Jennifer Pilcher regularly visits the clients. We welcome some of the clients each Sunday and others attend the Wednesday morning communion service in the church hall.

We have an active Pastoral Committee at Eastry Church which undertakes visiting and transportation for members of the community. If you know of anyone in

particular who would benefit from a visit from one of our team, please let me know.

One important initiative which has been undertaken between the Parish Council and the Church is the monthly publication of the Eastry Village News. The magazine committee have worked hard to produce this, to everyone's satisfaction and thanks must go particularly to Michael Kinns, the Editor who works continuously to ensure that the magazine contains the information and articles which people will find useful.

Other events to which village members are encouraged to attend include a "Jazz in the Garden" afternoon in August, at the Aumbry and a Murder Mystery Evening, taking place in October. Please see the village magazine to ensure that you have the dates in your diaries.

Finally, I would like to take this opportunity of thanking Iris and her council members for their co-operation and friendship during the past year and, on behalf of the Parochial Church Council, we look forward to this continuing in the next year.

#### **School Report - Mr Tim Halling**

Mr Halling gave a report that included all the activities that the school have been involved with over the past year. They included Gardening Club, Tennis, Golf, Rugby, Football, Netball, Swimming, world book day, pancake races, fund raising and many more. He also informed the meeting of the many trips and days out the pupils had been to back up curriculum teaching.

#### **8) POLICE ISSUES - Sergeant Guy Thompson Kent Police**

Sergeant Thompson started by informing the meeting that Kent would be keeping its own Police Force. Some reorganisations had taken place and new senior offices have been appointed. It is hoped this will make Kent police fit for purpose for the next 10 years. He also informed the meeting that Eastry was very lucky to have both a community warden and a PC with responsibilities for the village.

Sergeant Thompson then answered questions from the floor. There was a lot of concern about speeding traffic, it was agreed that the Clerk would e-mail a list of the roads where speeding was thought to be a problem. Police Speed checks would then be arranged.

## **CHAIRMAN'S REPORT - CLLR. SAM SHEVDE**

Since last years meeting the largest house building program in the village since Centenary Gardens has been completed, and is fully occupied, this is Heronden View with 24 new homes.

As yet we have no information on the development of the Eastry Hospital site, but we are told that things are moving, (perhaps backwards!). Plans have been submitted to enlarge the specialist units on part of the site- Namely Rivendale and Appledore). This will provide another special needs unit.

The Parish Council has had to deal with a large number of planning applications, mainly because people are extending the size of existing properties rather than moving to somewhere more costly. We have also attended a meeting with DDC and other groups to discuss the Local Development Framework where a possible 10,000 houses could be built in the Dover District area,- Perhaps Nick Kenton or Steve Mannion will comment later.

Sadly no real progress has been made on the upgrading of the Parade, the main hold up now is to find the funds to get the job done. Equally no progress has been made in the purchase of land from the Church Commissioners to extend the cemetery area. Perhaps Councillor Mollart may comment on this further.

Last year Eastry won the Kent Village of the Year, and part of the celebrations entailed a visit by the Lord Lieutenant of Kent, Mr Willets. He toured the village and later hosted a meeting of villagers in the Village Hall to thank people for their efforts.

Many people make great contributions to the well being of the village. I would like to say thank you to our Community Warden Bob Priestly for all his hard work and commitment to the people of Eastry. To Sheila Broster and Malcolm who keep the village clean and tidy. To Richard Swain for keeping the Public Conveniences up to scratch and for his work at Buttsole pond. I would also like to thank Trevor Burton for his work at the pond. Another thank you to Richard and his team for there continued work with the Neighbourhood Watch group.

Thanks also to John Kemp who is always on hand when the Parish Council needs a job doing in a hurry! I would also like to thank my fellow Councillors for their support during the past year. Thank you all.

The Annual Meeting is being held early this year because district and Parish elections are to be held in May. Anyone who wishes to stand for election to either will find details in the March issue of the Village News. You may also contact the Parish Clerk, Sarah Wells. Or DDC offices. Because the meeting is early this year there will not be a financial report, however the Parish Council's year end accounts and budget for 2007/08 will be published on the Parish Council Web-site and in a future copy of the Village News Letter.

One person who is not standing for re-election this year is Councillor Iris Mollart. Iris has been on Eastry Parish council for many years and has a wealth of local knowledge; she has also been a long standing school governor. Iris has, with her band of helpers, organised the very successful "Coffee Break" held in the Village Hall every Friday morning where people can come in for a chat and a "cuppa". She has also played an important role in the publication of Eastry Village News, which I and many others feel has been a great success. May I, on your behalf thank Iris for her long and outstanding contribution to Eastry Village life. I wonder what she is planning to do next?

## ALLOTMENTS AND LEISURE FILEDS REPORT

### **Gun Park.**

Last year I reported that we now had a Teen Shelter for the young people in the village. We had difficulty in obtaining this, and were delighted when after many months it finally arrived. This appeared to be a popular venue near the Youth Club.

Sadly, one night it was set on fire, and is now in a very sad state. It is unlikely that we will be offered a replacement.

The skateboard has again suffered vandalism at various times during the past year, which is a pity as it is a popular area and used regularly. The fence behind it has also been damaged, I am not referring to the main Graffiti, this the Council agreed should be allowed. Unfortunately fences are not covered by our insurance, so this vandalism is a costly business.

Some good news about Gun Park. Those of you who walk it regularly will, we hope, have noticed new benches, 3 in Gun Park and 1 by the footpath near the Centenary Gardens play area.

A Contractor has been asked to carry out some work on damaged trees in Gun Park, but due to the very wet weather the ground is water logged, and it has proved impossible for him to get the equipment onto the grass, without causing damage.

Motor bikes have been ridden across the grass, and have left ruts due to the sodden grass. If you see anyone riding motor bikes, here, please report it to Bob Priestly. It has been reported that some one was seen driving golf balls here, this is not allowed, and again should be reported to Bob.

### **Pavilion.**

Discussions have taken place between the Council and the Football Club with the view to the Club being granted a lease on the Pavilion.

An agreement has been reached and a lease for 21 years is being drawn up by Solicitors.

The Football Club will be responsible for service charges, and maintenance.

In our discussions it was felt by both parties, that granting a lease would help to secure the Clubs future, and allow them to apply for grants.

### **Allotments.**

In spite of the hottest summer for years, a hose pipe ban, and the most rapid growth of brambles seen for a long time the Allotments, this year have been a hive of industry.

For the first time for many years people are very interested in our Allotments.

As some have been neglected for some time and are very overgrown we have a contractor who will clear the rampant brambles, and other rubbish, making it easier for the first time gardener to make a start.

Pond.

Buttshole Pond is owned by the Church Commissioners, and during a recent inspection, carried out for them, 2 trees were marked which need attention. One is the Willow which was damaged in recent gales, and the other is a dead, tree on the edge of the Pond. Discussions have also taken place with Paul Hadaway from The White Cliffs Countryside Project, Wayne Wright, our local Policeman, who is the Wild Life and Conservation officer for the area, and Bob Priestly, with the view to clearing the brambles, at the far edge of the Pond these have spread rapidly, over the past few years.

There is a lovely painting of the pond at the far end of the hall which you might look at after the meeting. If there was a larger open area of water, hopefully, more wildlife could be encouraged.,

Bollards are also planned at the edge of the tarmac, to stop cars from parking on the grass near the picnic table.

### **Picnic Site.**

This a popular and well used site managed by K.K.C for us, from Brockhill Country Park. We meet their representative twice a year to discuss grass cutting, maintenance, any problems that have arisen, and suggestions for improvements.

Annually a tree inspection is carried out by K.K.C, and it has been noted that some trees now have large red numbers on them. Contrary to comments made to me, it does not mean that they are to be felled, it means that remedial work is needed on them, some branches are dead, and some too low to the ground to mow effectively.

There is an increasing amount of rubbish being left at the entrance to the picnic site late at night when the gate is closed. We are trying to address this problem, and have also asked if a police patrol car could check this area.

## **VILLAGE ORGANISATION REPORTS**



The Eastry branch of the Royal British Legion continues to meet on the third Monday of each month (excepting August) at Five Bells 8 pm. Despite losing some members to the march of time, others have taken their place and total membership has remained constant for 2006/7.

The Joint Services Social Club, an alternative to the RBL continue to raise funds for those in need by means of the weekly meat raffle, Sunday lunchtimes in the Five Bells. Twenty pound vouchers, for redemption in the local Food Stores, were distributed in January of this year. The meat prizes are also purchased from our village butcher Ted, helping to keep the local economy alive.

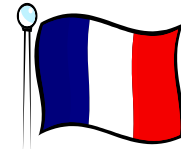
